Diocesan Year of the Eucharistic Revival



We are five months into the diocesan year of the <u>National Eucharistic Revival</u>. These are three important developments:

- We now have our own *Diocesan Prayer for Eucharistic Revival* available in English, Spanish, and French. Downloadable graphics for sharing on social media and templates for printing are available on the diocesan website. https://portlanddiocese.org/diocesan-prayer-eucharistic-revival
- 2. Almost 200 people from across the state participated in one of the regional parish leader days focused on the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist. Participants where challenged to grow personally as well as begin to discern how the Holy Spirit is inviting their local parish community to join in the grassroots movement of the Eucharistic Revival. During these days I gave participants three assignments:
 - Personal Witness Challenge = Craft a 3-5 minute response to at least one question
 - Why do I participate in Mass?
 - Who or what helped me to believe that Jesus Christ is truly present in the Eucharist?
 - How has believing that Jesus Christ is truly present in the Eucharist impacted my life personally?

- Key Teachings=put five key Catholic teachings on the Eucharist in your own words based on primary references like the Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC) and the United States Catholic Catechism for Adults (USCCA)
 - Eucharist (CCC 1322-1419, USCCA Chapter 17)
 - Real Presence (CCC 1374-1381, USCCA p. 223-224)
 - Transubstantiation (CCC 1357, USCCA p. 226)
 - Perpetual Sacrifice (CCC 1357, 1382, 1544, USCCA 220-222)
 - Holy Communion (CCC 1331, 1382, 1384, 1416, USCCA p 224-225
- Prayer and discernment for the next phase of the Parish Revival Year (June 2023-June 2024). Join with your pastor in discussions about questions such as:
 - What is our dream for our parishioners during the Eucharistic Revival?
 - What does the parish do best? How can this be utilized to engage people in eucharistic revival?
 - How are we in relationship with those people who only come to Mass occasionally? Who are those best able to make personal connections with these people to know that they are still loved and cared about as a member of the Body of Christ?
 - What will we stop doing or do differently to allow space to spend time with Christ as individuals and groups within the parish?
- 3. OLFF will resume hosting Regional Evenings for Catechists in March 2023
 - Sunday, March 19 2:00-4:30pm Holy Rosary Parish Center, Caribou
 - Monday, March 20 5:30-8:00pm Notre Dame Church Hall, Waterville
 - Tuesday, March 21 5:30-8:00pm St. Maximilian Kolbe Church Hall, Scarborough
 - The presenter will be Deacon Matthew Halbach, PhD (Sponsored by William H. Sadlier Religion) and will help participants focus on "Forming Eucharistic People." A flyer with costs and registration information for the following dates will be available in January.

Psychological First Aid Recap



October 29, 2022, marked the final organized diocesan date for Sweetser-sponsored trainings in Psychological First Aid, with trainer Maggie Norbert. Kudos to the **120 diocesan individuals** who participated in our scheduled trainings, from May to October. This response speaks to the concern and interest of so many who take the pastoral care of parishioners, family, and friends very seriously. Many who were unable to attend a training, due to outstanding circumstances, have inquired about the possibility of accessing future trainings.

Monthly Leader Learning Session



OLFF will facilitate monthly learning sessions for those currently leading parish efforts in catechesis, youth ministry, and sacramental formation. Modeled on the disciples' encounter with Jesus Christ on the Road to Emmaus (Luke 24:13-35), parish and diocesan leaders will engage each other for one hour on a specific topic, following three movements:

Listen: What are you discussing as you walk along? (Prayer, Introductions & Prompt Question about Local Experiences)

Learn: Jesus interpreted to them what referred to him in all the scriptures (Delving into Scripture, Tradition, Teaching & Best Practices)

Lead: they recounted what had taken place on the way and how he was made known to them (Conversation, Questions & Application)
