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Relaunching Annual Faith Formation Report



One goal of the diocesan catechetical plan is to develop a common framework for what constitutes effective and doable faith formation across the state. Part of working toward that aim is getting more consistent snapshots of what evangelizing and catechetical activities are taking place in parishes. We will gather this information by **reinstituting an annual parish faith formation report.** The reporting process uses our common tools of Excel and SharePoint to minimize the amount of work needed to enter, access, and update information now and into the future.

This yearly snapshot of activity benefits the parish by having all faith formation information in one place for planning, ministry-sharing and local accountability. It will also assist the diocesan Office of Lifelong Faith Formation (OLFF) in responding to common questions asked by parish leaders and inform discernment of where to focus diocesan resources for supporting parish ministries aimed at forming missionary disciples of Christ in the changing situations the Church faces.

Thank you in advance for working together to celebrate the ways in which the local parish is echoing God's Word and to create the mosaic of how the Holy Spirit is at work across Maine as we seek to make disciples who know, love, and serve Christ.

What this means for parishes:

- On January 25, the pastor/administrator and the primary catechetical contact at each parish received a link to a customized Excel document pre-filled with information OLFF already has for the parish. <u>Click</u> to preview a generic report. Instructions on how to enter the requested information are provided on each of the sheets in the workbook. The deadline for entering current data is February 28th.
- 2. OLFF will provide two virtual "Intro and Q&A" sessions via Teams on Tuesday, January 31 from 1-2pm and Wednesday, February 1 from 10:30-11:30am. Use this info to connect to either meeting.

Lay Continuing Education & Formation Grant




The Lay Continuing Education & Formation Endowment Fund, administered by the Catholic Foundation of Maine, was established through the *Strengthening the Heartbeat of the Church Campaign* in 2008. The purpose of the endowment was to build resources to support the present and future lay ecclesial ministry of the Catholic Church in Maine. <u>Click</u> to see the grant program overview that is also provided below.

The purpose of this fund is to provide grants to current employees and volunteers of parishes, Maine Catholic schools, and diocesan offices (such as pastoral life coordinators and associates, business coordinators, music ministers, catechetical leaders, teachers and youth ministers, etc.) to further their education and training related to professional service within the Church. This fund also provides parishes, Maine Catholic schools, diocesan offices, and affiliated organizations of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Portland with grants to support education, training, and the start-up of new initiatives related to adult faith formation and professional service to the Church. The fund is not intended for the annual budgets of ongoing or recurring programs.

Rite of Election 2023

Each year as Lent begins, the bishop, with and on behalf of the Christian community, "elects" those catechumens who are deemed ready to continue preparing for full intiation at the Easter Vigil. These catechumens become members of the "Elect," the chosen. Similarly, candidates for reception into full communion with the Catholic Church come forward to make a public commitment by answering the call to continuing conversion, thus readying themselves with the community for full reception into the Church.

The Most Reverend Robert P. Deeley, Bishop of Portland, anticipates celebrating the Rite of Election and the Call to Continuing Conversion for catechumens, candidates, sponsors/godparents, family members, or friends at the following three* churches across the diocese:

- Saturday, February 25 at 4:00pm--Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary Church, Presque Isle
- Sunday, February 26 at 10:30am--St. John the Baptist Church, Winslow
- Sunday, February 26 at 5:00pm--Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception, Portland

*There must be at least one adult catechumen registered to be presented at a site for the scheduled *Rite* to take place there.

The celebration will also be shared via live stream from Portland. If Bishop Deeley is unable to celebrate the Mass in Presque Isle or Winslow due to inclement weather, parish contacts will be notified. All catechumens and candidates from cancelled liturgies will be presented via live stream at the 5:00pm Cathedral Mass on February 26.

Highlights from LFFA Book Read



Five Quick Takes

- In addition to Penance and Anointing of the Sick, Baptism, Marriage, and the Eucharist have healing dimensions that are important for family life.
- The grace communicated in the sacrament of Marriage is not a one-time infusion, but an
 ongoing source of strength and power for couples in living out their vocation as spouses and
 parents.
- The healing effects of Baptism and Marriage are fruitfully received and extended through the life of a family by regular practices of love, prayer, reconciliation, acknowledgement, and service.

- The Eucharist is the "source and summit" of the life of the domestic church and its healing effects are extended in the life of a family by spent time together--especially at the family dinner table.
- The healing effects of these sacraments empower and equip Christian families to answer the call to be active agents of the New Evangelization in ministering to others.

"Confession is just such a gift, the grace and healing we gain from it is just amazing," remarked a parish leader at the January 12th LFFA meeting.

"There are just so many practices that the human family can do to bring about healing." A common practice amongst the group was family dinner. "Family dinner is where we come together to share a meal and talk about our day, share prayer requests and learn to listen and genuinely care for each other. It is an important practice in our household," affirmed a parish leader.

As parents it is a great witness to our children when we apologize when we have done wrong to them. It shows great humility, especially when we could choose to ignore the hurt that we have caused. It shows them that we are not perfect, and yet we are trying our best. It shows them that we make mistakes, but we can choose to start over (through reconciliation) when we make a mistake.

"Going to Mass together and taking some time afterwards to discuss what we heard in the Homily or what we gleaned from the readings has been a way that we as parents can help our children understand our Catholic faith so that they may go out and evangelize others. Faith begins when it is modeled in the home through the family,"

The group who took part in the conversation read Chapter 4 of the Renewing Catholic Family Life book and prayerfully pondered the major themes of the chapter. Each of us gleaned a different insight as we read the chapter. We invite you to read the chapter and prayerfully ponder the questions on page 93 and discuss your thoughts or insights with a colleague or friend.

Discussion Questions:

- What are the four effects of the grace of the Sacrament of Marriage according to the Catechism of the Catholic Church (1641-1642)
- Can you identify a time when you experienced healing through your reception of a sacrament? What was the sacrament and what was the fruit of the healing?

- Identify three regular practices in your household that help its members draw on the healing effects of the sacraments. What are two additional practices you believe you should add to these?
- In **Evangelii Gaudium,** Pope Francis teaches that "Every Christian is challenged, here and now, to be actively engaged in evangelization (120)." How are you responding to this challenge in the daily life of your household?



Inspiration



In a recent virtual writing workshop participants were asked to write a letter to 2022. After concluding our letters several people read theirs out loud. One of the sentences that has stuck with me (Hannah) since goes something along the lines of "maybe life isn't so much about seeing the glass as half empty or half full. Maybe instead life is about realizing that the glass can be refilled." I've thought about and reflected on that quote a lot since then. When I am running on empty, when I am tired, or when things aren't going according to my plan do my thoughts become pessimistic or do they remain hopeful? Do I turn to the One who can fill me, the One who is Living Water? Do I ask Him to fill me with the joy, the hope, the peace, the rest, the love that I am needing? Scripture proclaims:

You anoint my head with oil, my cup overflows (Psalm 23:5)

Come you who weary and burdened, and I will give you rest (Matthew 11:28)

Until now you have not asked anything in my name. Ask and you will receive and that your joy may be complete (John 16:24)

Sometimes we are empty wells. Jesus is the Living Water that comes to restore and refresh us. All we need to do is ask.
