## Sunday Celebrations in the Absence of a Priest: Celebration of the Liturgy of the Word with Holy Communion

#### **Assembly**

-- Full, conscious, and active participation

#### <u>Ushers</u>

- -- Distribute prayer guides as people arrive
- -- Collect the monetary offerings during Announcements, bring to altar
- -- Secure funds collected in usual manner

#### <u>Deacon or Layperson Serving as the</u> <u>Leader of Prayer</u>

- -- Prepare vessels and credence table for distributing Communion
- -- Place corporal on the credence table before liturgy begins
- -- Introduction
- -- Greeting
- -- Collect
- -- DEACON ONLY: Gospel/Homily
- -- Introductions of Profession of Faith
- -- Introduction/Closing to the Prayer of the Faithful
- -- Communion Rite
- -- Introduction to the Our Father
- -- Invitation to Communion
- -- Purify vessels used for Communion
- -- Prayer of Thanksgiving (if recited)
- -- Concluding Rite
- -- Introduce Collection (if included)
- -- Prayer for the Vocation to Priesthood
- -- Blessing
- -- Invitation of the sign of peace
- -- DEACON ONLY: Greet assembly at the main doors as they leave the celebration

#### Extraordinary Eucharistic Minister/Sacristan

- -- Assist with preparing vessels for distribution (if needed)
- -- Retrieve the Blessed Sacrament from the tabernacle, if located in a different place than within the worship space
- -- Distribute communion

#### 1st Reader and/or 2nd Reader

- -- Old Testament reading (New Testament reading during the Easter season)
- -- New Testament reading
- -- Prayer of the Faithful
- -- Announcements (during the collection)

#### Associate Lay Leader of Prayer

- -- Proclaim the Gospel reading (when there is no deacon present)
- -- Read the homily prepared by the pastor or the designated reflection

#### Music Leader

- -- Psalm (if sung)
- -- Gospel Acclamation
- -- Communion Hymn
- -- Prayer of Thanksgiving (if sung)
- -- Instrumental during collection (optional)
- -- Instrumental at the sign of peace OR sing a concluding song

#### **Guide to Liturgical Terms in SC Ritual**

ambo



podium usually only used during the Liturgy of the Word, usually a permanent or substantial furnishing in the sanctuary

Book of the Gospels



liturgical book composed of the Gospel readings assigned for each Mass; only deacons can use during a SC liturgy

ciborium



covered vessel used to hold consecrated hosts reserved in the tabernacle and for distribution during the Communion Rite

corporal





white linen cloth that unfolds from a small square to a larger cloth that is laid flat on the altar where the Blessed Sacrament will rest whenever outside the tabernacle

credence table



small table in or near the sanctuary that holds the corporal and other items needed for the Communion Rite

lectern



minimal podium used to hold the ritual text for the leader of prayer

lectionary for Mass



liturgical book composed of the scripture readings and the responsorial psalm assigned for each Mass of the year (Sundays, weekdays, and special occasions)

liturgical greeting



All:

Deacon: The Lord be with you. And with your spirit.



plate or shallow bowl to hold consecrated hosts for distributing Communion

purificator



linen cloth napkin used to wipe Communion vessels

purify vessels used for communion



leader of prayer places uncovered ciborium on corporal on altar, tilts empty paten over ciborium then wipes around the inside of the vessel to ensure any remnant of the Blessed Sacrament is transferred to ciborium and reserved in the tabernacle. Move used purificator and empty paten to credence table as clear altar

sanctuary



area in worship space surrounding the altar, usually includes ambo, seating for the priest and deacon; area often elevated

What a Leader of Prayer Does

In a Sunday Celebration in the Absence of a Priest (SC) who leads a particular element of the liturgy and how it is done differs whether led by one deacon or two laypeople. The chart indicates similarities and differences in the elements and leadership responsibilities for SCs between deacons and laypeople.

What a Leader of Prayer Does



From the Greek meaning "public work." It refers especially to the public worship of the Church, including Mass and the Liturgy of the hours.

## **Liturgical Prayer**

#### Do everything in a spirit of prayer

- Ground yourself in the liturgical principle lex orandi lex credendi lex vivendi that translates As we pray so we believe; as we believe so we live
- Cooperate with the Holy Spirit and the whole community to lift hearts and minds to the glory of the Most Holy Trinity

#### Be an example of reverence

- Solemn bow toward the altar
- Genuflect toward the tabernacle
- Keep an unhurried pace
- Speak clearly with appropriate emotion and inflection
- Include silence

- Prepare ritual book with needed bookmarks and additional texts for the specific Sunday
- Do the red. Say the black.
- Walk through SCs liturgy in the worship space, including setting up the sanctuary
- Be mindful of postures, motion, and gestures like inviting responses, bowing, genuflecting, or blessings so you move with ease, avoiding stiffness that would call attention to you rather than guide the assembly into deeper prayer
- Look up at the beginning and end of a prayer or reading
- Read prepared texts and make prescribed gestures only to follow the Church's norms and eliminate ad-libs

Sample Explanation for Assembly New to Sunday Celebrations in the Absence of a Priest Given by SC leader of prayer or other liturgical minister 10 minutes before SC begins

Your presence and participation in the Sunday Celebration in the Absence of a Priest is a legitimate way to keep holy the Lord's Day along with the Church in liturgy. At the same time, you may leave if you would prefer to attend a weekend Mass at a different time or at a different church.

There are similarities and stark differences between the celebration of Mass and the Sunday Celebration liturgy we will pray today. You will notice:

- There is no entrance procession or opening hymn.
- The Introductory Rite includes the Sign of the Cross and a greeting, though there is no Penitential Rite since a priest is not present to lead it or Gloria since we are not offering the sacrifice of the Eucharist.
- The Liturgy of the Word is similar consisting of the 1st reading, responsorial psalm, 2nd Reading, Gospel acclamation, and the Gospel. A Homily is given by a deacon who is the leader of prayer whereas a lay leader of prayer reads a reflection prepared by the pastor or from an approved resource.
- A profession of faith is made, and then the universal prayers are offered.
- When possible, the Communion Rite consists of setting the altar, retrieving the Blessed Sacrament from the tabernacle, reciting the Our Father, and the distribution of Holy Communion.
- Following the Communion Rite, an Act of Thanksgiving is led by the leader of prayer using a psalm or a song of thanksgiving may be sung.
- The Concluding Rite consists of making announcements and taking up the collection, a
  prayer for vocations to the priesthood, the final prayer, and a sharing of the sign of
  peace.
- There is no formal dismissal at the end of the liturgy or a recessional procession (*Optional*: We will sing hymn, however). You may leave after I leave the area by the altar (the sanctuary) and begin to exit the church as well.

#### **OUTLINE FOR LITURGICAL MINISTERS**

with page references to SC Ritual Text (USCCB 2012) lead by a deacon or diocesan appointed lay prayer leader(s)

Musician may play instrumental music before lay prayer leaders take their places in the assembly

Introductory Rite: Lay Prayer Leader #1

Lay Prayer Leader #1 bows/genuflects then goes into the sanctuary to read introduction – pg. 77

Leads congregation in the **Sign of the Cross** – pg. 78

Offers the **Greeting** – pq. 78

Leads assembly in the **Opening Prayer** for correct liturgical season – pgs. 79-82

Liturgy of the Word: Lay Prayer Leader #1, Lector, Cantor/Musician, Lay Prayer Leader #2

Lay Prayer Leader #1 invites community to sit and listen to God's word – pg. 82

Lector does **First Reading** assigned for that date

Cantor either sings or speaks Psalm assigned for that date and everyone gives the response

Lector does the Second Reading assigned for that date

Cantor sings or speaks the Gospel Acclamation

Lay Prayer Leader #2 proclaims **Gospel** reads Gospel assigned for that date (omits 'The Lord be with you..." and starts with "A reading from the holy Gospel according to ...")

Lay Prayer Leader #2 reads a **Reflection on the Gospel** prepared/designated by the pastor

Lay Prayer Leader #2 returns to pew for Period of Sacred Silence

Lay Prayer Leader #1 returns to sanctuary to lead **Profession of Faith** – pg. 85

Lay Prayer Leader #1 introduces Prayer of the Faithful with one of the options on pg. 87

Lector offers **Prayer of the Faithful** intentions (no Mass intention since not a Mass!)

Lay Prayer Leader #1 concludes the intercessions with prayer on pg. 87 or one from the Appendix III

Lay Prayer Leader #1 reminds that collection will take place following Communion/Act of Thanksgiving



If there are not enough consecrated hosts reserved in the tabernacle to distribute Holy Communion to everyone, skip directly to the Act of Thanksgiving

Communion Rite: Lay Prayer Leader #1, Cantor/Musician, Extraordinary Ministers of Communion (EM)

Lay Prayer Leader #1 prepares the altar (goes to the credence table to sanitize hands, pick up a lighter and a corporal; s/he lights the candles on the altar, unfolds the corporal cloth on top of the altar, genuflects in front of the tabernacle, opens the tabernacle, takes out the ciborium with Blessed Sacrament and places it on the altar, removes the cover if one, then returns to stand with ritual book) – pg. 88

Lay Prayer Leader #1 invites everyone to say the Lord's Prayer – pg. 88

Lay Prayer Leader #1 goes to the altar, genuflects, takes a consecrated Host from the ciborium then says the **Invitation to Communion** prayer (Behold the Lamb of God...) then and leads the congregation in the response (Lord, I am not worthy...) – pg. 89

Lay Prayer Leader #1 takes Communion her/himself; if needed, gives communion to EM then gives each a paten (or ciborium) to help distribute holy Communion

Lay Prayer Leader #1 and EM give communion to the parishioners

Cantor/Musician may lead congregation in an appropriate song during Holy Communion

EM returns paten to the altar then returns to pew

Lay Prayer Leader #1 combines any remaining consecrated hosts into one ciborium, wipes out empty paten into main ciborium with purificator, covers ciborium then returns the Blessed Sacrament to the tabernacle. S/he genuflects before closing and locking the tabernacle.

Lay Prayer Leader #1 returns to the altar, extinguishes the candles, refolds the corporal, places the corporal and purificator on top of any empty patens before returning them to the credence table

Lay Prayer Leader #1 returns to designated pew for moment of private prayer



Lay Prayer Leader #1 returns to the sanctuary to lead the congregation in **Act of Thanksgiving** – options on pg. 90-94 (may also be a song)

**Concluding Rite:** Lay Prayer Leader #1, Ushers, Lector, Cantor/Musician

Lay Prayer Leader #1 introduces collection and announcements then returns to pew

Ushers take up **Collection** and bring to altar

Lector makes **Announcements** from ambo

Musician may play instrumental music during collection

Lay Prayer Leader #1 leads congregation in **Prayer for Vocations to the Priesthood** from the sanctuary – pg. 94

Lay Prayer Leader #1 says **Blessing** (makes no Sign of the Cross) – pg. 95

Lay Prayer Leader #1 invites everyone to share a Sign of Peace then leaves through side entrance-pg. 95

Cantor/musician may conclude the celebration with a song or instrumental music
