

Ash Wednesday March 5

Ash Wednesday is a day of special relevance Catholics, as it marks the beginning

Lent, a 40-day period of reflection, penance and spiritual preparation for Holy Week. During this day, fasting and abstinence are practiced, and the imposition of ashes is performed, an act of humility and spiritual renewal. This season invites the faithful to draw near to God with repentance and spiritual growth.



Saturday, February 8th, a Day of Reflection, led by our **Bishop** James Ruggieri, at Sacred Heart, Portland.



It is called "Annunciation" to the visit of the Archangel Gabriel, sent by God to the Virgin Mary, to ask her to be the Mother of the Word, by the grace of the Holy Spirit.

She, conscious of her dignity

and at the same time of her smallness, consented, giving herself unreservedly to the will of God. The "Yes" of Mary Most Holy opens the way to the Incarnation that occurs at that moment. At that moment the Word became flesh. Eternal God came to dwell in it assuming human nature.



Saint Joseph March 19

In God's reconciling Plan, Saint Joseph had an essential role: God entrusted him with the great responsibility and privilege of being the adoptive father of the Child Iesus and of being Virgin Mary's husband. Saint Joseph, the Holy Custodian of the Holy Family, is the closest saint to Jesus and the most


Holy of the Virgin Mary.

He was probably born in Bethlehem, the city of David from which he was descended. At the beginning of the story of the Gospels (shortly before the Annunciation), St. Ioseph lived in Nazareth.

According to Matthew 13:55 and Mark 6:3, St. Joseph was a tekton. The word means in particular that he was a carpenter or mason.

Our Lord Jesus was called "Son of Joseph", "the carpenter" (In 1:45; 6:42; Lk 4:22).

As we know, he was not the natural father of Jesus, who was begotten in the virginal womb of the Virgin Mary by the power of the Holy Spirit and is the Son of God, but Joseph lovingly adopted him and Jesus submitted to him as a good son before his father.



Lent lasts 40 days; It begins on Ash Wednesday and ends before the mass of the Lord's Supper of Holy Thursday. Throughout this time, especially in the liturgy of Sunday, we make an effort to regain the rhythm and style of true believers that we must live as children of God.



The liturgical color of this time is the abode that means mourning and penance. It is a time of reflection, of penance, of spiritual conversion; Preparation time for the Paschal mystery.

In Lent, Christ invites us to change our lives. The church invites us to live lent as a path to Jesus Christ, listening to the word of God, praying, sharing with others and doing good deeds. It invites us to live a series of Christian attitudes that help us to look more like Jesus Christ, because by action of our sin, we move away more from God.

For this reason, lent is the time of forgiveness and fraternal reconciliation. Every day, throughout our lives, we must throw from our hearts the hatred, the rancor, the envy, the jealousy that opposes our love for God and the brothers. In Lent, we learn to know and appreciate the Cross of Jesus. With this we also learn to take our cross with joy to reach the glory of the resurrection.

40 days

The duration of Lent is based on the symbol of the number forty in the Bible. In this one, one speaks of the forty days of the flood, of the Forty years of the march of the Jewish people through the desert, of the forty Days of Moses and of Elijah in the mountain, of the forty days that Jesus spent in the desert before beginning his public life, of the 400 years that lasted the stay of the Jews in Egypt.

The practice of Lent dates from the fourth century, when the tendency is to constitute it in time of penance and renewal for the whole church, with the practice of fasting and abstinence. Conserved quite vigorously, at least initially, in the churches of the Orient, the penitential practice of Lent has been increasingly lightened in the west, but a penitential and conversion spirit must be observed.
